CONSIDERATIONS FOR PREACHING

The readings for **“God’s work. Our hands.” Sunday, on Sept. 13**, go beyond simple forgiveness, exploring how forgiveness rebuilds and restores a fractured community. The readings aren’t about flippant forgiveness, cheap grace or pretending but about how costly it is to reconnect. Each emphasizes that forgiveness is not shallow but instead requires effort.

Healing the Wounds We Carry

Forgiveness does not erase or mitigate our memories. We may lower the volume on them, but they can still be heard; other times, they may be mute, but the sound is still deafening. In Genesis, the memory Joseph’s brothers have of Joseph weighs on them. They remember selling Joseph into slavery. Even after Joseph and his brothers have lived together in Egypt for years, experiencing forgiveness and reconciliation, the brothers’ fear lingers. Their guilt lingers. Their trauma lingers. The memory lingers. What does Joseph say amid it all? “Do not be afraid! Am I in the place of God? Even though you intended to do harm to me, God intended it for good” (Genesis 50:19-20). He reshapes the memory: “I know you intended this, but my God intended something far greater.” Forgiveness isn’t about forgetting; it’s a choice made every day not to live in that intolerant space but to free and restore yourself in a new beginning. Joseph granted his brothers the provisions of the promise of forgiveness.

Living Together Beyond Judgment

In his letter to the Romans, Paul writes, “We are the Lord’s” (14:8). He says this to a group of tense people experiencing everyday disagreements over food laws, personal convictions and holy days. They’re bickering and thinking they know best without meeting and without hearing the other side. What does Paul do? He tells them to stop judging and casting stones at one another, to embrace their differences. This text shows us a practical method for living in forgiveness. We must stay connected, embrace our differences and love one another despite it all. We mustn’t let those differences distance us from one another. As the body of Christ, we must learn how to navigate and uplift the beautiful complexities of the church, which is made up of a multitude of people.

Receiving the Forgiveness, We Resist

In the book of Matthew, Peter asks Jesus if he should forgive those who sin against him as many as seven times. Hearing this, Jesus says something extreme and shocking: “Not seven times, but, I tell you, seventy-seven times.” Forgiveness is not finite. In the parable that follows, a servant is forgiven a substantial debt, then refuses to forgive a small one in return. The servant has forgotten the mercy, love and kindness he received. His



memory erases what others have given him. How can we graciously return what God gives us? When we forget the love we have been given, the grace poured out for us and the mercy offered when we least deserve it, we become not of God. When we remember and emulate the forgiveness God had shown us, forgiveness can flow to others. We can stop counting and start caring.

Forgiveness should not be seen as a private act. The text tells us the opposite; in fact, forgiveness is communal. As we celebrate “God’s work. Our hands.” Sunday this year, working together on projects as a church and a community, we must remember that when we stay connected and share in forgiveness, it can transform our life together. When we are connected to one another, we see how forgiveness sustains a community amid differences, how a family withstands challenges. We see that, when we fail to forgive as generously as God does, grace is nevertheless poured out freely.

WORSHIP TEXTS

Prayer of the Day

O Lord God, merciful judge, you are the inexhaustible fountain of forgiveness. Replace our hearts of stone with hearts that love and adore you, that we may delight in doing your will, through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord. **Amen.**

OR

Holy One, you stretch wide your tent that all may be welcomed in, and in Jesus you stretched out your hands in expansive love for a weary and wounded world. Help us to reach out with your own wounded hands of love, that through us your life may be known in the world, through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord. **Amen.**

PRAYERS OF INTERCESSION

The prayers are prepared locally. The following sets of intercessions may be adapted or used as appropriate.

Trusting God at work in and among us, we raise our hearts and voices in prayer for the needs of the world.

For your work in the church, we give thanks. Plant and tend relationships among faith communities, both ecumenical and interfaith, that in faithful listening, speech, and action, our hands work to bear fruit for the sake of all in need. God of grace, we pray,
hear us when we call.

For your work in creation, we give thanks. Sustain peoples and places affected by climate change, ecological devastation and natural disasters. Prosper the work of creation-care ministries locally and globally, that with our minds and hearts opened, our hands work to lovingly care for the earth. God of life, we pray,
hear us when we call.

For your work among the nations, we give thanks. Direct leaders in paths of honest service, that both their words and actions are carried out on behalf of those whom they serve. God of righteousness, we pray,
hear us when we call.



For your work in places of need, we give thanks. Sustain all who are wearied by unemployment or lack of adequate food or housing, that we advocate for relief and just policy. Bring healing to all who are sick through the skillful hands and compassionate hearts of physicians, nurses, therapists and caregivers. (*We pray especially for...*) God of restoration, we pray,
hear us when we call.

For your work in our neighborhoods, towns and cities, we give thanks. Guide our common life together so that children, youth and adults of all ages flourish. Teach us to listen attentively to our neighbors, that any new endeavors consider those who may be left out or underserved. God of wisdom, we pray,
hear us when we call.

For your work in this worshiping community, we give thanks. Bless the service project(s) of this day and throughout the year. Foster deeper connections among those who serve and a spirit of accompaniment as we work alongside those in our community. Strengthen our faith, that we trust God moving in and among us. God of love, we pray,
hear us when we call.

Here other intercessions composed for the local community or related to a local service project may be added.

For your work among those who came before us, we give thanks. We remember those who have died and are held forever in your loving hands (especially). Hold us in your presence now and always. God of heaven and earth,
hear us when we call.

Receive these and all our prayers, gracious God. We pray in the name of Jesus and by the power of the Holy Spirit.**Amen.**

OR

Prayers of Intercession

Gathered into God's embrace, let us lift our voices on behalf of a weary and wounded world.

God of love, send us out filled with your love and life. Be known in our daily living, that your love may be known through our proclamation. God, we pray,
open our hands in love.

God of creation, remind us to be good stewards of your diverse and beautiful world. God, we pray,
open our hands in love.

God of peace, fill the hearts of those who rule, govern and lead. Give them and us compassion to guide the peoples of this world in the ways of truth, justice, equity and peace. God, we pray,
open our hands in love.



God of healing, visit those who yearn for your wholeness, especially those whose names and needs we lift up now (*names and needs added as desired*). Encourage all those who bear another's burdens. Give wisdom and perseverance to all who work in health care professions. God, we pray,
open our hands in love.

God of service, give us strength and humility. In our service to those near and far, whose needs are visible or invisible, may we find you in the faces of our neighbors. God, we pray,
open our hands in love.

For what else do we pray?

Here other intercessions composed for the local community or related to a local service project may be added.

Everlasting God, support us in this life. As we remember those who have gone before as examples of faithful living and honor those whose faith was known only to you, inspire us to follow their example of baptismal life until we join with them in worship. God, we pray,
open our hands in love.

Into your wounded hands of love, O God, we place all our prayers, trusting in your mercy through the crucified and risen one Jesus. **Amen.**

Additional Prayers

In addition to the collects below, you may wish to consider prayers related to your particular service project. For example, if the project relates to creation care, a specific prayer on care for the earth may be fitting. See Evangelical Lutheran Worship pp. 72–87 and All Creation Sings pp. 46–55.

Mighty and merciful God, lover of justice and equity, you call us to support the weak, to help those who suffer, and to honor all people. By the power of your Holy Spirit, make us advocates for your justice and instruments of your peace, so that all may be reconciled in your beloved community; through Jesus Christ our Savior. Amen. (ACS, p. 47)

By your word, eternal God, your creation sprang forth, and we were given the breath of life. By your word, eternal God, death is overcome, Christ is raised from the tomb, and we are given new life in the power of your Spirit. May we boldly proclaim this good news in our words and our deeds, rejoicing always in your powerful presence; through Jesus Christ, our risen Lord. Amen. (ELW p. 75)

Draw your church together, O God, into one great company of disciples, together following our teacher Jesus Christ into every walk of life, together serving in Christ's mission to the world, and together witnessing to your love wherever you will send us; for the sake of Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. (ELW p. 75)

Direct us, O Lord God, in all our doings with your most gracious favor,
 and extend to us your continual help;
 that in all our works begun, continued, and ended in you,
 we may glorify your holy name; and finally, by your mercy, bring us to everlasting life;
 through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord. Amen. (ELW p. 86)

Thanksgiving at the Table

Honor, praise, glory and thanksgiving
to you, God, our loving Creator.

and gave us hearts and hands and voices
to live your loving purpose in the world.

Seeing the lonely creature of earth,
you created a partner that we would know the joy of community.
Throughout the history of your people, you never abandoned us,

Holy Jesus, in this meal you have fed and nourished us to work in your beloved world. Send us now, filled with yourself and strengthened by your Spirit to live your love for others.

Amen.

Blessing

God who sets forth the law of love,
Jesus who fulfills the law for you,
and the Spirit through whom you are called to love,
+ bless you this day,
that you may be God's hands and heart and voice
at work in the world.

Amen.

Dismissal

Go in peace. You are God's hands at work in the world!

Thanks be to God.



AFFIRMATION OF CHRISTIAN VOCATION

Within the sending rite of the service, this affirmation may be made by individuals or groups, and may be introduced by a description of the area of service to be affirmed.

Or, the affirmation may be made by the whole assembly.

The presiding minister addresses those affirming Christian vocation.

Siblings in Christ, both our work and our rest are in God.

Will you endeavor to pattern your life on the Lord Jesus Christ,
in gratitude to God and in service to others, at morning and evening,
at work and at play, all the days of your life?

I will, and I ask God to help me.

Almighty God, by the power of the Spirit you have knit us your servants into the one body of your Son, Jesus Christ. Look with favor upon us in our commitment to serve in Christ's name. Give us courage, patience, and vision; and strengthen us all in our Christian vocation of witness to the world and of service to others; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Amen.

OR

CELEBRATION OF VOCATION AND BLESSING OF HANDS FOR MINISTRY

Following the hymn of the day, or before the blessing at the sending, the assembly may share a brief rite of celebrating our vocations and blessing hands for ministry. Oil may or may not be used for the blessing of hands.

We are called to proclaim the good news:

God is at work!

This good news is not left in some history long ago or a place far away:

God is at work in the world still today!

In us and through us, God is glorified in our work.

When we offer a helping hand, God is praised.

When we share of our abundance, God is known in the world.

God is at work in us!

In our service today and in our daily lives,

let us live out what God has called us to in baptism.

God is at work through our hands!

Here the assembly may be seated while an appropriate hymn or song is sung. Individuals may come forward and receive a blessing on the backs and palms of their hands.

Signing a cross on the backs of the hands:

God bless your hands and your work,

Signing a cross on the palms of the hands:

that through you God's love may be known.

Amen.



BLESSING AND SENDING FOR MISSION

This order is intended for use when material resources or people are being sent forth from the assembly as a tangible expression of the baptismal call to share in Christ's mission to all the world.

This order may precede the blessing and the dismissal in a congregation's primary service, or it may be adapted to be used independently.

The leader addresses the assembly, adapting these words to the occasion.

Friends in Christ: Today we give thanks to God and seek God's blessing as we send these _____ to *description of destination and purpose*.

Let us pray.

Blessed are you, O Lord our God, ruler of the universe.

You made the whole earth for your glory; all creation praises you.

We lift our voices to join the songs of heaven and earth
in thanksgiving for the many blessings you have given us.

Renew in us the commitment to use our gifts in the service of others, especially of those in need.

Let us be your hands to feed the hungry, shelter the homeless,
clothe the naked, comfort the weary and outcast,
welcome the stranger, care for creation,
and be loving neighbors to all people.

The leader continues with one or more of the following petitions, adapting as appropriate.

Sending of people

Bless those who go out from here to labor in/at _____.

Prosper the work of their hands.

Bless those who receive [them and] the fruits of their labor,
and may those who are sent receive blessing in return.

May the gifts they use and share be signs of your love to all people.

Food, sustenance

Bless these _____.

May those who receive them be nourished and strengthened,
and may these gifts be a sign of your love to all people.

Medical and personal-care supplies

Bless these _____.

May those who receive them be cared for and healed,
and may these gifts be a sign of your love to all people.

Clothing, quilts

Bless these _____.

May those who receive them find dignity in their use and comfort in their warmth,
and may these gifts be a sign of your love to all people.



The prayer concludes:

To you, O God, be glory and honor through your Son, Jesus Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, in your church and in the world, now and forever.

Amen.
