

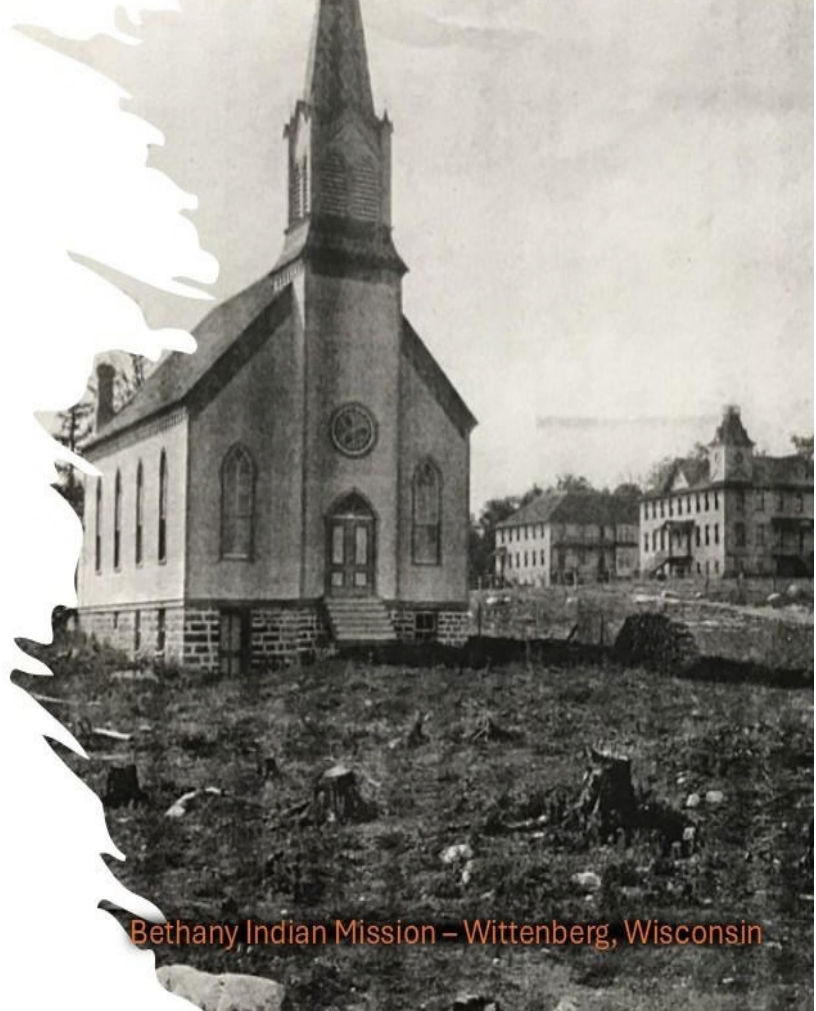
ELCA Truth-Seeking & Truth-Telling Initiative on Indian Boarding Schools

The U.S. government forced Indian families to send their children to boarding schools to eradicate tribal culture and break family ties, causing irreparable harm to both families and children. Churches played a primary role in operating many of these schools. An ELCA predecessor denomination founded and ran Bethany Indian Mission in Wisconsin. Survivors of boarding schools continue to carry the burden of this injustice, which has led to generational trauma.

We seek information about Bethany and other Lutheran involvement in boarding schools to share with impacted tribes. We raise awareness within the ELCA community. The ELCA passed a memorial to commemorate September 30, the National Day of Remembrance for Indian Boarding Schools.

The goal of this initiative is healing. You are invited to join us.

- Hold a book or movie discussion about Indian boarding schools for deeper learning.
