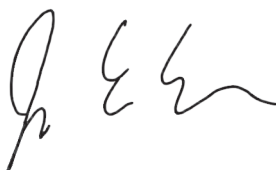

ONGOING RESPONSES

Your generosity to Lutheran Disaster Response supports community-led efforts before, during and after disasters. This sustains the impact of your gifts long after a disaster occurs as we accompany survivors throughout the recovery process. See how your gifts to Lutheran Disaster Response in recent years are still at work here in the United States and in communities around the world:

2022

RUSSIA-UKRAINE WAR

Lutheran Disaster Response continues to accompany partners throughout Central and Eastern Europe, its support made possible by your generous gifts. This accompaniment of displaced Ukrainians includes housing, home repairs, underground schools, legal assistance, and spiritual and emotional care.

In Romania, an LDR partner organization provides education, legal assistance and mental health care to Ukrainian refugees.

AIDROM

SUDAN CIVIL WAR

As civil war broke out in April, refugees fled to nearby countries such as Chad, Egypt and South Sudan. Your support enables Lutheran Disaster Response to accompany partners in these countries, providing Sudanese refugees with food, shelter, safety and access to water.

SOUTHEASTERN SPRING TORNADOES

Lutheran Disaster Response's continuing presence in Alabama, Arkansas, Georgia, North Carolina and Mississippi has taken the form of community outreach, construction management and the rebuilding and repairing of homes. Because of your generosity, this support has been extended to address damage caused by more recent storms in the region.

MIDDLE EAST CRISIS

Lutheran Disaster Response is accompanying partners in the region that provide medical care, ensure continued access to education, support people with intellectual disabilities and offer healing from the trauma of war in Gaza and the West Bank. In Lebanon, Lutheran Disaster Response supports partners that provide shelter, food and household items and that keep children in school.

HURRICANES HELENE AND MILTON

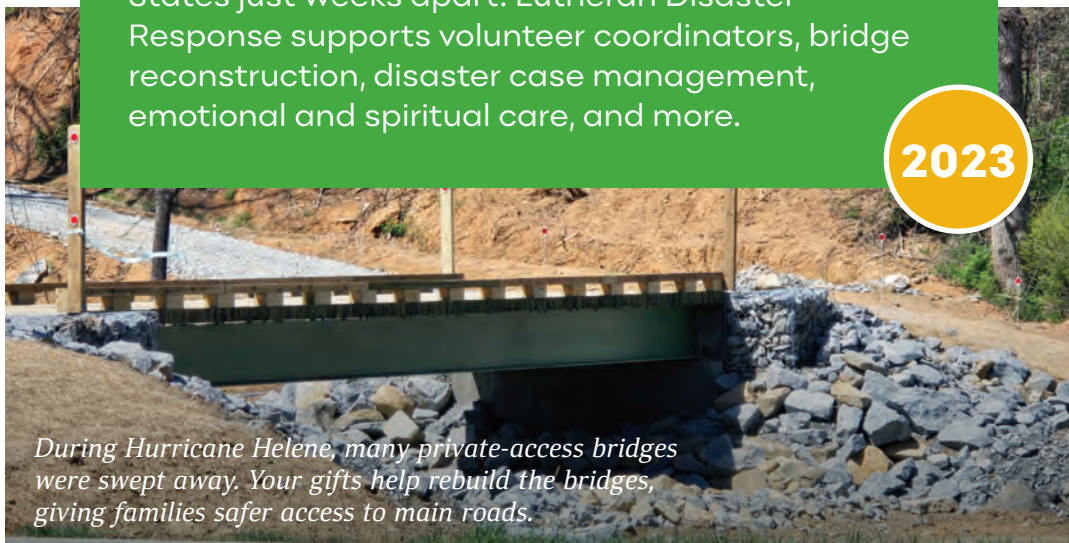
Hurricane Helene and Hurricane Milton brought devastating winds and catastrophic flooding to the same areas of the southeastern United States just weeks apart. Lutheran Disaster Response supports volunteer coordinators, bridge reconstruction, disaster case management, emotional and spiritual care, and more.

MAUI WILDFIRES

Communities on Maui continue to recover after wildfires broke out in August. Thanks to your gifts, Lutheran Disaster Response has been able to support community-led efforts to help survivors of the wildfires. This includes housing, food support, household supplies, and emotional and spiritual care.

HURRICANE DEBBY

Hurricane Debby struck North Carolina and Georgia in August, causing significant damage to homes and infrastructure. 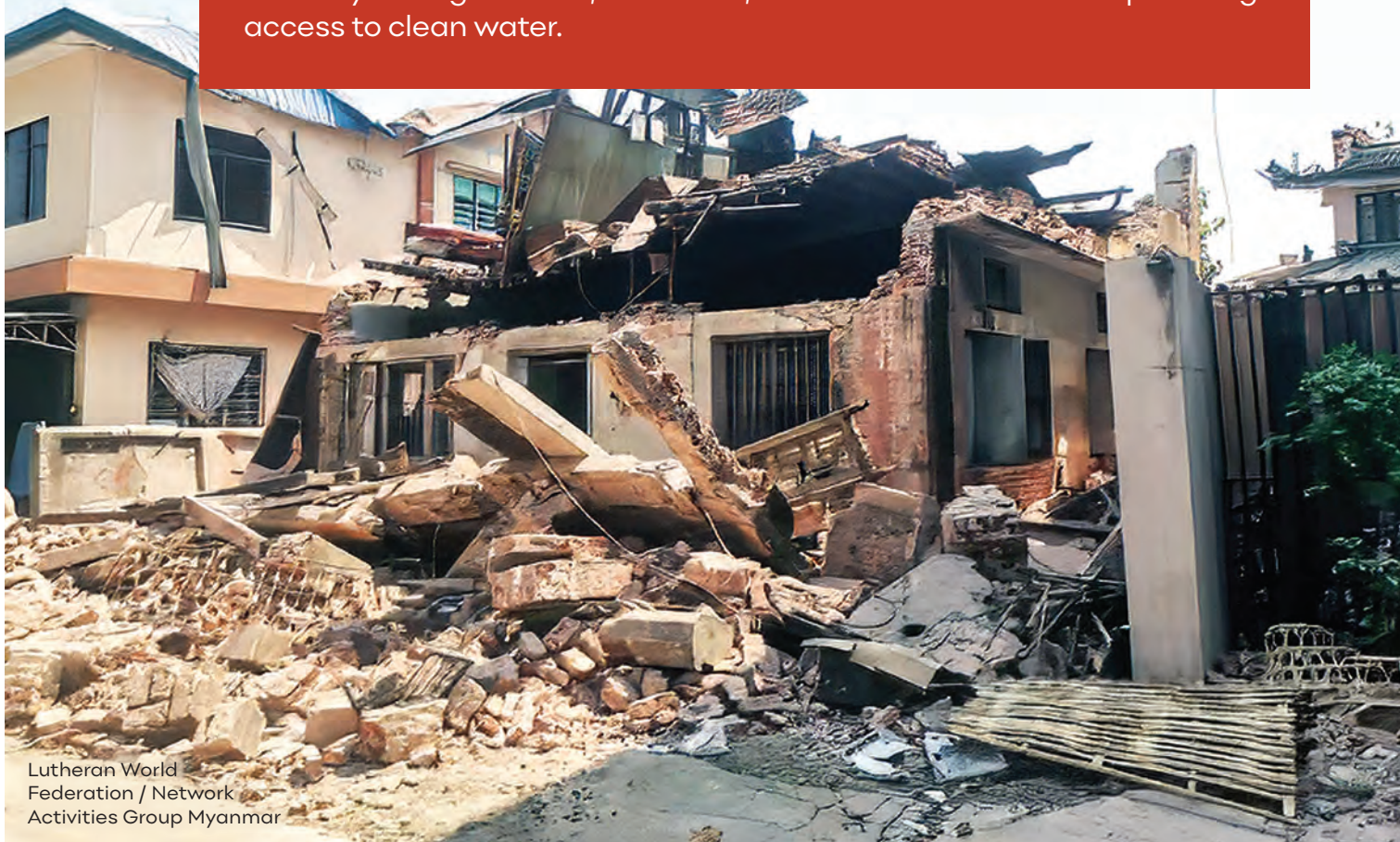
LOS ANGELES WILDFIRES

Devastating wildfires broke out in Los Angeles County in January, burning tens of thousands of homes and displacing thousands of households. Because of your generosity, Lutheran Disaster Response is supporting a synod disaster response coordinator, community gatherings for fire survivors, disaster case management, meals for older adults and a local food pantry's response.

MYANMAR EARTHQUAKE

In March, a 7.7 magnitude earthquake hit Myanmar, followed by aftershocks with magnitudes as high as 6.4. The quake damaged homes, schools, businesses, infrastructure and places of worship. Thanks to your donations, Lutheran Disaster Response is supporting recovery through shelter, food relief, home reconstruction and providing access to clean water.

HURRICANE MELISSA

Hurricane Melissa tore through the Caribbean in October, hitting Cuba as a Category 3 storm. The country was still rebuilding after previous hurricanes and an earthquake, its recovery efforts hindered by the effects of Hurricane Melissa. Lutheran Disaster Response assisted survivors by distributing food and medicine, repairing homes and offering emotional and spiritual care.

Fearless Faith

after the Fires

From atop the Haleakalā volcano in Maui, Nettie Aquino, known affectionately as “Aunty Nettie,” watched wildfires consuming the western side of the island in 2023. At the time, she worked as a tour bus driver, but as she witnessed the fires, Aunty Nettie found a new calling.

“I knew this was going to be a game changer, that this was going to be a new purpose,” she recalled. Aunty Nettie dropped her tour group off on the south side of the island, away from the fires, then turned right around and headed to a shelter further north.

Aunty Nettie had no plan when she reached the shelter — she just knew that she had to help. When she arrived, there were only 10 people there. The 11 of them set up 2,800 cots as people from Lahaina and the surrounding areas streamed in. For 21 days, this was the largest shelter on Maui.

“I went into the space not knowing what to do. I wasn’t trained for it. I just knew, as a survivor, what I needed,” said Aunty Nettie. “I went based on my fearless faith that I wasn’t going to stay home.” She saw what the people needed and ensured that they got it. Through her leadership, she earned the title “Aunty.” She didn’t want to be called “boss” or “chief” — just “aunty.”

After the emergency shelter closed and people temporarily moved into hotels, Aunty Nettie’s work didn’t slow down. She helped the people in the hotels get their IDs, their licenses and even DNA tests to connect them with lost relatives. She knew the community, and its people knew and trusted her.

In September 2023, Aunty Nettie founded a nonprofit called Nā Kia’i O Maui, meaning Guardians of Maui. She and her volunteers built the Lahaina Resource and Recovery Center, where survivors can get everything they need for rebuilding, from furniture to food to clothing. The center now has 15 shipping containers, each 40 feet long, that are filled with resources for the community.

Auntie Nettie describes herself as a “relationship person,” always putting the people she serves first. The resource center “is a place with no judgment. It is a safe place for survivors to come through the way they are. We greet them with respect. We greet them with love and aloha.”

The Lahaina Resource and Recovery Center, funded in part by your gifts to Lutheran Disaster Response, has served 6,000 families since the fires. Auntie Nettie collects donations from the wider community to give to recipients for free. One time, she secured 3,500 king-size beds from a hotel. Within three months, all the beds had been claimed.

Auntie Nettie is quick to point out that the community leaders are survivors too and carry the weight of the people they help. “Since the beginning of my journey, I’ve been trying to find space for me to heal,” she reflected.

A group recently approached her and asked if it could build a healing space, called an *umeke lā’au*, at the center. When she asked the group whom the healing space was for, the leader said, “It’s for you, Auntie Nettie, and healers like you that serve our community.” She thought about it, prayed on it and said yes. The installation of the *umeke lā’au* began.

The people of Maui are still recovering from the wildfires. Because of your unwavering support, Lutheran Disaster Response can continue to accompany local organizations such as Nā Kia’i O Maui and leaders such as Auntie Nettie.

“The ministry I do is an active one,” she said. “It is speaking life and prayers over [survivors]. It is about showing them God’s love.”





Sheltering from the Storms

Oaks Indian Mission in Oklahoma hosts a residential program for boys, and its members are no strangers to severe weather. The next storm is simply a matter of “when,” not “if,” which is a source of anxiety for some.

Damian Hawley, an 18-year-old living at the mission, was one of those who grew anxious during storms. Growing up, he moved around a lot and sometimes lived in homes that lacked a safe place to shelter during severe weather. Strong winds and tornado warnings frightened him.

When Oaks Indian Mission received a grant from Lutheran Disaster Response to build storm shelters on its property, Damian knew that these would be invaluable and immediately wanted to participate in the project. A strong leader who wants to protect others, he posted signs directing people to the nine new shelters, took part in emergency drills and helped younger boys learn the new safety procedures.

Now the mission has enough shelters to protect all the residents and staff in case of an

emergency. Though the project was designed to enhance residents’ physical safety, staff saw that it also strengthened their sense of emotional security. “Before we had the shelters, I was always scared when storms came because I didn’t know where we would go,” said Damian. Since the nine shelters were built, he has been noticeably less anxious when severe weather approaches.

Preparedness and resilience building are key aspects of Lutheran Disaster Response’s work that you support through your gifts. When a community is prepared for disaster, it can keep individuals safer and give them greater peace of mind.

Regrowing Confidence in Namibia

Maria Nangalo's life revolves around crops — she is a small-scale farmer and part of a community garden in Sauyemwa, Namibia. Sudden changes in weather can make or break her harvest for the year. So when her area was inundated by flooding after a severe drought, her livelihood was in danger.

Because of the unusually heavy rainfall, Maria and her neighbors couldn't plant in their garden for six months. "Many of us were discouraged and worried about how we would feed our families," she said.

In response to this crisis, the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Namibia, supported by your gifts to Lutheran Disaster Response, developed a program on disaster resilience. When it arrived in her community, Maria became deeply invested. The project team helped local farmers understand how changes in the weather — especially droughts and flooding — impact their crops and how those effects could be mitigated.

Program leaders listened to Maria's concerns and her description of the barriers she faced because of the flooding. "We received counseling, practical guidance on how to prepare the soil again, and training on how to protect our crops better in the future," she said.

The training helped Maria regain her confidence in her farming skills, which she had lost after her crops were destroyed by floods. Without the program, Maria and her neighbors might have lost their harvests over and over. "The project helped me remember my strength," reflected Maria. "I can still produce food and support my family, even after a disaster."

Your gifts to Lutheran Disaster Response share hope with those impacted by disasters around the world, who learn to recognize and trust in their own resilience.

The Sauyemwa community garden is thriving again. Though the area could be impacted by future flooding or droughts, Maria said she and her neighbors are more confident that they will respond quickly and avoid the worst effects on their crops. "I feel proud that we did not give up and that our hands are working again to feed our families."

From Uncertainty to Safety

When War War Kyaw's home in Myanmar started shaking in March 2025, she knew her life was about to change.

A 7.7 magnitude earthquake was jolting her community, to be followed by a 6.4 magnitude aftershock. When the ground steadied, War War Kyaw looked around to inspect the aftermath. Her house was damaged, the water tap was broken and the lights were out. Bridges and roads throughout the village were destroyed.

War War Kyaw drew up a list of everything her family now needed: food, shelter, clean water, electricity. The list was daunting, and her family had limited resources to satisfy their needs. Because the infrastructure around them was so badly damaged, they had trouble navigating

the town, and no one in her family could find or hold on to work. Their income disappeared.

Even when the aftershocks were over, War War Kyaw said, she still felt as if the ground were shaking, which made it nearly impossible for her to get a night's sleep. "Even when there's no earthquake, I still feel like one is happening." During this time, War War Kyaw felt as if she were living under a dark shadow.

War War Kyaw and her family lived with this instability for several weeks before a team from one of Lutheran Disaster Response's partner organizations arrived in their community.

Because of your generosity, War War Kyaw received bamboo, tarps and wood to build a temporary shelter. Food and water distributions allowed her to cook healthy meals for her family.

The project made a huge difference in the community as well. Solar-powered streetlights were installed, which made it safer to be out at night, and new public toilets reduced the risk of disease.

“Looking back, I see the difference clearly: from fear and uncertainty to safety,” said War War Kyaw. Your gifts to Lutheran Disaster Response change lives, giving people who have been impacted by disasters the resources they need to rebuild.

MYANMAR

When a major earthquake struck in 2025, Myanmar was still recovering from Typhoon Yagi a year earlier, which had brought the worst flooding in the region in 60 years. The country was also convulsed by civil war, which displaced more than 3.5 million people across the country. The military junta blocked some humanitarian aid, enforced checkpoints and conscripted aid workers, making recovery difficult.

In many areas around the world, including Myanmar, disasters compound each other to create overlapping humanitarian crises. Lutheran Disaster Response works with local partners to focus on each community's needs whether these are caused by conflict, earthquakes, flooding or a combination of all three. Ongoing support from donors such as you helps Lutheran Disaster Response form deep relationships with communities and local partners, which enables them to address new challenges as they arise.

Healing into Hope

Halima lives in Syria, where a devastating earthquake and years of conflict and political upheaval have impacted many aspects of her everyday life, including reliable access to healthcare. Aleppo, where Halima lives, has only seven fully functional hospitals.

Despite these challenges, Halima wanted a child. Her first two pregnancies had failed because she needed consistent treatment to address a blood-type incompatibility. Halima couldn't afford basic medical care, let alone the specialized care she needed for the repeated complications.

Halima was eight months into her third pregnancy when she faced difficulties again. She would need a C-section and individualized care. Having lacked this kind of support in the past, she and her husband felt helpless. "We knew what was needed, but we had no way to afford it."

Hearing about her situation, one of Halima's neighbors told her about a local health center, supported by your gifts to Lutheran Disaster Response, that cares for women in vulnerable positions. To Halima's great relief, its resources were offered at no cost.

When Halima arrived at the clinic, she was attended to immediately. When it was time, she safely delivered her baby and received essential postnatal care, including medication that would protect her reproductive health and prevent further complications.

The health center "gave us hope when we had none," said Halima. "I never imagined I could receive this level of care without any cost." Halima and her baby were discharged in good health. Thanks to your generosity, the care they received was above and beyond what she could normally afford.

In Syria, Lutheran Disaster Response has taken a holistic approach to a protracted humanitarian crisis. Over the years, your support has accompanied refugees fleeing from conflict and survivors of a major earthquake, and now it's providing healthcare for vulnerable communities. Thank you!

Accompanying Migrants with Dignity

Over 10 years ago, the ELCA Southeast Michigan Synod assembled an immigration task force. The group aspires to advocate on behalf of immigrants, to educate congregations around the synod about issues related to immigration, and to support migrants, refugees and asylum-seekers in their communities.

Jessica Beamer, the chair of the task force, has crossed paths with many people seeking refuge in the United States. “These are incredibly strong people that had no desire to leave their other country other than they had no other choice,” she said.

Among them was an asylum-seeking Muslim family from Venezuela. Over two years, members of the synod task force helped them

get situated in Michigan with housing and other essential needs. Recently the family was forced to leave the United States and seek asylum elsewhere. Even as the family prepared to depart, the group ensured that the next leg of their journey would go as smoothly as possible — buying them plane tickets, helping them renew their passports and translating travel documents from English into Spanish.

In a letter of gratitude for the task force, the mother wrote, “From the moment we arrived in this country, you were more than support, you were an embrace, a refuge, and a light that made us feel at home even while being far from our own.”

The success of this task force is being replicated around the country. Through AMMPARO, the Southeast Michigan Synod and another group from California connected with a group in Texas that wanted to grow immigration support networks in the region. Jessica provided the Texas group with advice from her task force's years of experience.

The changing landscape of immigration enforcement in the United States led the task force to collaborate with its local partners in new ways, creating a network of clergy and laypeople to support one another as they accompany migrants in their communities.

Supported by your gifts, AMMPARO connects synods, congregations and communities throughout the country in the shared goal of walking alongside our migrant neighbors through every step of their journey, no matter what direction it takes.

This year marks the 10th anniversary of the ELCA's AMMPARO strategy (Accompanying Migrants with Protection, Advocacy, Representation and Opportunities). It was adopted at the 2016 Churchwide Assembly to put the ELCA in a strong position for effective accompaniment of migrants in communities across the U.S. and around the world. Over the past 10 years, a strong network of 280 ELCA congregations and 60 synods has been formed to accompany forcibly displaced people.

Through AMMPARO, migrants arriving in the United States are accompanied as they seek safety and legal status. If they are deported or choose to return to their country of origin, they are served by global AMMPARO partners. International accompaniment started with three ministries in two Central American countries; a decade later, the ELCA works with 25 ministries in 19 countries around the world.
